

Introducing the Carolina Asia Map



Beginning this year, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Asia are just a click apart.

The Carolina Asia Center (CAC) at UNC recently released the Carolina Asia Map, an interactive map and searchable database. The map aims to provide a comprehensive list of every connection between Asia and UNC-Chapel Hill. Users can search study abroad programs, faculty partnerships, research collaborations and more by country, city, partner institution and UNC department.

The map has been years in the making. Morgan Pitelka, Professor of Asian Studies, first envisioned the map when he became director of the Carolina Asia Center in 2013. Compiling, sorting and mapping the data took more than a year after the initial work began.

"We are delighted to offer this resource to the Carolina community," said Thupten Norbu, Interim Director of the Carolina Asia Center. "We hope this initiative will serve as a one-stop database to learn about UNC's collaborations in Asia and strengthen our collective understanding of and involvement with Asia."

Above all, the CAC intends the Carolina Asia Map to be a collaborative project. A link beneath the map allows users to suggest corrections or submit new programs. As members of the Carolina community contribute their knowledge, the map will become a more thorough and helpful resource.

Celebrating 10 Years of Phillips Ambassadors

Since the summer of 2007, the Phillips Ambassadors scholarship program at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill has encouraged undergraduates at UNC and nearby Duke University to look toward Asia for their study abroad experiences and to deepen their understanding of Asian countries, culture, and language regardless of their academic major.

The Phillips Ambassadors Program marks its 10th anniversary this year and has supported more than 260 undergraduates in their study abroad endeavors in Asia. The program is honoring its impressive legacy by offering five \$10,000 awards to Phillips Ambassadors alumni to encourage further engagement with Asia at home or abroad.

"We wanted to do something that would reinforce the spirit and purpose of the Phillips Ambassadors Program," said Earl N. "Phil" Phillips, who, with his family, established the Phillips Ambassadors Program. Phillips a Carolina alumnus, entrepreneur and former United States ambassador has had business interests in Asia for more than 25 years.

In marking the 10-year milestone of the scholarship program, Phillips said he and his family decided to look no further than the program's alumni. "Our alumni are our strength and a tremendous resource for each other and Carolina overall," Phillips said.

Ambassadors alumni have graduated from Carolina and continued along their unique career and academic paths in medicine, law, business, the arts and the humanities, and all have been influenced in some way by their study abroad experience in Asia.

Stressing that he himself is not on the selection committee for the scholarship or special anniversary awards, Phillips said he is looking forward to seeing the five winning proposals. "I've heard that there are filmmakers, educators, entrepreneurs and national security experts among the alumni who are interested in applying for the award," said Phillips.

Teacher Enrichment Day with Anne Chesnutt Middle School


38 staff members from Anne Chesnutt Middle School in Fayetteville, NC, gathered at the Ackland Art Museum on July 8, 2016, for a day of global enrichment. Faculty and staff from across campus came to deliver a day packed with global activities.

Anne Chesnutt is a year-round middle school in Fayetteville (Cumberland County) that offers Spanish and Mandarin Chinese and was recently awarded a grant from the Teachers of Critical Languages Program to add Arabic. As a Global Communications School of Choice, the school aims to strengthen students' critical thinking, creativeness, and communication skills through continuous teaching and learning of their language of choice, serving about 400 students.

To increase global awareness and engagement, the entire staff participated in sessions on each world area covered at Anne Chesnutt: the Middle East, China and Latin America. Nadia Yaqub, chair of UNC's Department of Asian Studies, delivered an "Introduction to Arab Cultures" lecture. Mariah Smith. Ph.D. candidate in the UNC School of Education and a Spanish Teaching Fellow in the Department of Romance Studies, led a workshop on "A Crash Course on the Connections between Latin America, the Caribbean and Beyond." Asian Studies Associate Professor Li-ling Hsiao led an information session and tournament of the ancient Chinese board game Five-Stone Go, and Ackland Art Museum's Jenny Marvel finished the day with an interactive museum tour called "Exploring World Cultures Through Art."

This program was a collaborative effort of the Ackland Art Museum, Carolina Asia Center, Duke-UNC Consortium for Middle East Studies, UNC-Duke Consortium in Latin American and Caribbean Studies, and Cumberland County Schools.

Professional development resources include multimedia resources, online workshops, webinars, summer institutes, seminars, and more. We hope these opportunities will help K-14 educators who want to bolster their knowledge of Asia and apply it to the classroom.

UNC System Asia Scholar Network



The Carolina Asia Center launched an innovative program for Asia scholars in North Carolina last academic year. The UNC System Asia Scholar Network, funded by the Title VI grant from the U.S. Department of Education, connects faculty and graduate students studying Asia-related topics across the 16 UNC System universities.

On February 26, 2016, the Asia Scholar Network's first conference took place in the FedEx Global Education Center at UNC-Chapel Hill. Titled "New Directions in Asian Studies," the conference featured talks by 17 scholars from nine UNC System universities. Topics included "Urbanizations in India and Japan," "Identity and Culture" and "Interdisciplinary Perspectives in the Study of Muslims and Pakistan."

Leslie Boney, Vice President for International, Community, and Economic Engagement at UNC General Administration, delivered welcome remarks on the importance of global engagement in the UNC System. He highlighted the connections North Carolina higher education has

developed with both China and India, producing two global engagement reports available at northcarolina.edu/our-time-our-future/strategic-directions-initiative.

The "New Directions in Asian Studies" conference will be followed by annual conferences for the Asia Scholar Network as well as year-round access to UNC libraries and other resources for members. UNC System faculty interested in joining can contact brittany.darst@unc.edu.

"Toward a Non-Eurocentric Academia"



In May 2016, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Duke University, and the University of Bremen hosted their second collaborative workshop, "Toward a Non-Eurocentric Academia: Border Thinking and Decoloniality," at the FedEx Global Education Center at UNC-Chapel Hill.

The workshop spanned ten days in which 22 young scholars and activists joined together with faculty from these three institutions to think through and discuss various issues—including race, gender, and the colonial legacies—which confront contemporary scholarship and social justice movements on campuses worldwide. The event was sponsored by the Carolina Asia Center at UNC-Chapel

Hill, Duke University's Center for Global Studies and the Humanities, the UNC-Chapel Hill Departments of History and Religious Studies, and the Bremen Institute for Postcolonial and Transcultural Studies.

Triangle East Asia Colloquium



In March 2016, the Carolina Asia Center hosted the 2016 Triangle East Asia Colloquium. This conference is the flagship annual meeting of the Triangle East Asia Consortium, which was established in 1976 to promote dialogue and collaboration among East Asian studies faculty at Duke University, North Carolina State University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

The 2016 colloquium featured three panels: "Inter-Asian Connections as Politics and Scholarship," "Circulation of Texts Within and Beyond Sinosphere, Indic and Islamicate Asia," and "Inter-Asian Encounters as a Site of Modern Buddhist and Muslim Thought." Faculty from all three TEAC universities presented. Prasenjit Duara, Director of the Duke Global Asia Initiative, and Seteny Shami, Program Director at the Social Science Research Council-InterAsia, also contributed remarks.

North Carolina Central University

NCCU Partnership

The Carolina Asia Center at UNC-Chapel Hill has developed a strong partnership with North Carolina Central University in Durham, N.C. With the support of the Title VI grant from the U.S. Department of Education, the CAC has collaborated with Dr. Matthew A. Cook, Professor of Postcolonial and South Asian Studies at NCCU, to create South Asia-focused programming for the benefit of both universities and the Triangle area.

Since August 2015, the CAC-NCCU collaboration has resulted in several successful events and shared projects on various South Asian topics. With the CAC's support, Dr. Cook at NCCU and Dr. Iqbal Sevea of the Department of History at UNC-Chapel Hill jointly hosted visiting scholar Aqsa Ijaz from Lahore, Pakistan, from September 1 to December 31, 2015.

Ijaz, the American Institute of Pakistan Studies Joint NCCU/UNC-CH Junior Visiting Faculty Fellow, conducted research at both universities and presented a lecture on "Parallel Narratives of Identity and Self in Contemporary Pakistani Art and Literature" at the CAC. Attendees included UNC & NCCU students and scholars and community members from around the Triangle.

This year, several other scholars also presented lectures with the support of the CAC and NCCU. In spring 2016, Dr. Walter Hakala of the State University of New York at Buffalo, Dr. Puskar Sahoni of the University of Pennsylvania's South Asia Center, and

Dr. Cara Cilano of UNC-Wilmington visited NCCU. Dr. Hakala spoke on "Setting the World on Fire: Syphilis and Chilies in Old Word Vocabularies;" Dr. Sahoni presented a lecture titled "Squaring a Circle: Design and Construction in the Temple at Anwa;" and Dr. Cilano presented on "Parody, Satire and Spatial Visions in Pakistan." All the talks were well-attended by faculty, students and community members.

In addition to daytime presentations at NCCU, Dr. Hakala, Dr. Sahoni and Dr. Cilano also made evening presentations to faculty from around the Triangle area via two colloquia by the North Carolina Consortium for South Asian Studies. These colloquia were co-organized by Dr. Cook (NCCU), Dr. David Gilmartin (NCSU), and Dr. Sevea (UNC-Chapel Hill).

This summer, in collaboration with Dr. Asia in the Triangle area. Cook and Dr. Charles Kennedy at Wake Forest University, the CAC also hosted

Dr. Saaed Shafqat, Professor at Forman Christian University in Lahore, Pakistan, as a part of the Pakistan Lecture Series tour sponsored by the American Institute of Pakistan Studies and Wake Forest University's Middle East and South Asia Studies Program. Dr. Shafqat presented on "Perceptions, Realities, and the Changing Dynamics of U.S.-Pakistan Relations" at the CAC in August 2016.

Dr. Cook is also an active member of the UNC System Asia Scholar Network, an initiative of the CAC which connects Asia scholars across the UNC system. We heartily congratulate Dr. Cook on being appointed Vice President of the American Institute for Pakistan Studies (AIPS) and Dr. Iqbal Sevea on being selected to serve as an AIPS Executive Committee Member. Building on our partnership, the CAC will continue working with Dr. Cook to raise awareness and understanding of South Asia in the Triangle area.
